Sail across the sea and you can enjoy glorious scenery and dramatic history, with a huge choice of attractions

Northern Ireland might not be at or near the top of your must-visit destinations list, but it certainly should be. The shortest crossing (with Stena Line) takes two hours and 15 minutes, from Cairnryan in Scotland to Belfast. Sailing from Liverpool will take you around eight hours.

Once there, you'll be hugely impressed by the fabulous destinations and attractions to choose from, both out in the wilds and in the towns and cities. Northern Ireland

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boasts numerous unspoilt seaside resorts, world-famous natural phenomena and one of the UK's great new museums, but it's the warm welcome you'll experience from these superbly friendly folk that will make the biggest impression.

Beyond Belfast, the gorgeous countryside in this surprising province is just sensational, making it the perfect region to explore in a motorhome.

Uniquely beautiful landscapes, world-class beaches and truly wild spaces – Scotland really does have it all! So it's no surprise that this wonderful country is increasingly popular for touring. These days, with the introduction of the hugely successful NC500 road trip, visitors are realising the peaceful bliss of driving through mountains, heathland and

coastal areas. In the Highlands, the gorgeous coastlines and wealth of ancient sites are worth risking the summer midges for, while the country's milder weather lends itself to pleasant hiking, walking and cycling in the beautiful national parks.

Always make use of a pre-departure checklist

It pays to use a simple pre-departure checklist before you set off:

Use the cruise control

If your 'van has cruise control, use it, because it is easy to increase your speed without realising.

When changing lanes, remember 'M-S-M-M'. Overtaking demands double-checking in the nearside mirror that your vehicle is well clear of what has been passed, before returning to the original lane.

Watch out for the wind

Motorhomes can be susceptible to buffeting by winds on exposed stretches of motorway and when crossing long bridges. The 'Rule of Ten' applies here. If the motorhome is affected, gradually reduce your speed by 10 miles an hour. Still not happy? Slow down by another 10mph, and so on.

Keep the kids entertained

If you're touring with children, journeys of 150-200 miles are long enough. Much more than that and nerves will begin to fray, and your first day or so away will be spent unwinding from the drive.

For longer journeys, it's worth splitting the driving in two, with an overnight stop at a campsite. Or get up early and beat the worst of the traffic while the children are snoozing in the back.

Keep kids happy by breaking long trips

Take your time on the road

Remember the most important fact, that you're on holiday! Why hurry? Give yourself plenty of time to complete your trip in as relaxed a way as possible, and allow for regular breaks every couple of hours, so that you stay alert on the road.
